
American Street

Sixteen-year-old Tina leaves Kenya and slips into the Congo, from where she and her mother fled years before, seeking revenge for her mother's murder.




Dreamland Burning


A Face Like Glass

After an attempt is made on her life, Mariko disguises herself as a boy and infiltrates a gang of bandits, determined to hunt down the person responsible.




The Gentleman's Guide to Vice and Virtue


The Inexplicable Logic of My Life


Midnight at the Electric

Intriguing epic tale of the intertwined fates of Lenore (England, 1919), Catherine (Oklahoma, 1934) and Adri (Kansas, 2065).




Once and for All

Chapel Hill's own beloved YA author is back with an entertaining, humorous romance set in the world of wedding planners.





Hilarious and heartfelt romantic comedy about two Indian-American teens whose parents conspire to arrange their marriage.




When Morning Comes
